The icing on the cake was the new project of early intervention which is a mother-child intensive training for a whole year! This was made possible with the implementation support of United Way, Bengaluru. We see endless possibilities when the primary caregiver is empowered and helped to understand their own child's capabilities and needs.

We undertook two global projects. One was the great opportunity to co-host Global Autism Convention in December. We had a wonderful year and I am ever so grateful to every individual who have supported our work through the years. The list is long and I am not able to put down all the names here but I am sure our work has been made possible only through their good wishes and blessings of the Almighty.



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INTRODUCTION CTION

Academy for Severe Handicaps and Autism (ASHA) Charitable Trust provides education along with a comprehensive set of therapies to individuals with autism spectrum disorders. Starting with 3 children in a small rented building in 1995 today, 85 children are undergoing various intervention and therapies in the day school program. In over two decades, ASHA has evolved and developed capabilities and expertise to address the different needs of children of all age groups including adolescents. More than a thousand families have been supported in many different ways in the last two decades.





EARLY INTERVENTION

The early intervention training sets the path for all future skill building in children with special needs. This forms one of the most important service areas in special education. We have twenty four children below six years in our early intervention program along with the mothers or primary caregivers. We believe that a parent helped is a family helped. Our program involves special education, physiotherapy, speech therapy, counselling and parent training. This is also supported by dance and arts based intervention.



PRIMARY EDUCATION

The program caters to the needs of children above the age of 6 years based on an individual education plan (IEP) that is created based on the child's needs, skills and parent expectations. It involves a mix of functional academics, communication, self help skills and life skills training. This is a full day program and a teacher-student ratio of 1:2 is maintained for a better learning experience.



PRE-VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Involves teaching skills that will help the child above 12 years to maximize productivity in a vocational or a work environment and put them on the path towards self sufficiency. Activities involve following a set routine, assembly line etc.



LIFE SKILLS TRAINING

Life skills are what enables a child to function independently in the community. It can involve something as simple as tying shoe laces and more complex activities like shopping independently.



TECHNOLOGY AIDED INSTRUCTION

Technology can be used to teach a variety of skills including early intervention, developing communication, pre-academic skills and vocational skills. The commonly used forms of technology are computers and iPad at ASHA.

THERAPIES

Speech therapy, occupational therapy and physiotherapy bring significant difference in children with neurodevelopment disorders. Speech therapy improves communication, occupational therapy helps improve daily functioning skills and physiotherapy improves movement and motor skills.



YOGA

Yoga has been known to bring significant improvement in body movement, flexibility and strength. In children with autism, yoga brings a reduction in anxiety, builds communication skills and improves the overall health and well being.



MUSIC THERAPY

Music has been known to have therapeutic effects on children with special needs. It promotes communication, relaxation and activates parts of the brain that improves cognitive functioning. ASHA started music therapy this year and so far there has been marginal improvement in the children.



ADDITIONAL TRAINING DURING 2018-19 AIMS MULTIMEDIA TRAINING PROGRAM

The AIMS Ability Enhancing Multimedia Program (AEMP) aims to teach children with autism and special needs multimedia and animation with the goal of employment. The program began in August 2017 at ASHA.

The program started off with the basics of drawing - lines, curves, shading, object drawing and colouring.

Our students never cease to surprise us with their drawing skills!

ASSESSMENT, TRAINING AND GUIDANCE CENTRE

The Assessment, Training and Guidance Centre is a part of ASHA. The centre was established in 2013 and provides screening for autism and learning disability, psycho educational assessments, early intervention, remedial sessions, counselling and workshops.

The centre is located in Mahalaxmi Layout and is easily accessible by the Bangalore Metro. In 5 years, the centre has grown to become a hub for information for parents and professionals about the latest Government schemes, autism teaching methods, advocacy and new therapies. From the year 2018-19, the centre conducts an early intervention program for children with learning difficulties.



SERVICES CES

ASSESSMENTS

To understand a child's strengths and areas of needs, conducting assessments is important. The centre provides screening tools to detect learning difficulties, hyperactivity and autism as well as psycho-educational assessments to identify areas of need to suggest an intervention.



INFORMATION CENTRE

The centre provides information on all Government schemes and social services. The centre also has a directory of special schools, residential organisations, therapy centres and inclusive schools in Bangalore and Karnataka.

REMEDIAL SESSIONS

The centre provides one on one remedial sessions for children with mild autism and learning difficulties. An individual education plan (IEP) is prepared for each child. These sessions address needs of children with autism and also support children with learning difficulties perform better in a mainstream school.



Enabling and empowering parents is an important part of intervention. We believe intervention should happen at school as well as at home for it to be effective. The centre conducts regular workshops for parents as well as professionals on a variety of topics ranging from assistive technology, communication, reading and writing for children with learning difficulties and autism, diet management and others.

The centre also supports new therapies such as music therapy, yoga and arts based therapies.



SELF ADVOCACY

The centre is also the first in west Bangalore to initiate a self advocacy group for individuals with autism. The objective of the self advocacy group is to come together and create strategies to improve autism services, bring changes in policy and build a network to socialise. We conduct programs for young adults to come, meet and develop a plan to improve the autism service sector.



COUNSELLING

Parents of children with a developmental delay or any special needs may face significant stress trying to balance expenses, work and household tasks. Many children in mainstream schools also face difficulty due to bullying, teasing among other things. To address these problems and help in adjusting, the centre provides counselling services to parents and children.

WEEKEND & SUMMER PROGRAMS

The centre conducts weekend and summer programs for all children for overall development. The activities usually consist of art, theatre, music and outings to parks, restaurants and movies.



RESEARCH MICROSOFT RESEARCH

Researchers from Microsoft Research headed by Mr. Chiranjib Bhattacharrya conducted a session to understand how artificial intelligence through robots and drones can help children with autism to learn more efficiently. The first practical session was conducted on 28th January where a simple story was read out with the help of Cosmo - a small robot. The second session was on 9th March where the researchers used a drone to identify pictures. Based on the child's choice, the drone would fly and land on the picture.







RESEARCH AYURVEDA

Dr.Nischal P., a final year PG Scholar in the Dept. of PG Studies in Dravyaguna at Sri Sri College of Ayurvedic Science and Research, Bengaluru, conducted a clinical research study titled, 'A clinical evaluation of Durva - Cynodon dactylon Linn in Manasavikara with special reference to Autism'.

The study was conducted on 33 children.

The study was conducted from 27th February to 22 April 2019 which included;

- Orientation regarding the clinical research study and explanation of Consent form to Parents.

- Demonstration of Abhyanga (Massage) to Parents.

- Enrolment of Cases to the Clinical Study.
- Conduct of Clinical study.

The results of the study are awaited.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS

On 21st July 2018, Special Olympics International is being assisted by Asian Institute of Technology, Bangkok to evaluate the impact of the Young Athletes Program across four countries supported by IKEA Foundation. The project is titled "An Impact Evaluation Project of Special Olympics Young Athlete and Child Development Program". This program involved evaluation of children below the age of 7.5 years. A team of experts from Amity University evaluated children on 20th and 21st of June 2018. ASHA was provided with a special young athlete kit and the coaches from special Olympics Bharat visited us for 6 months on weekly basis for training the children.



KALAANGANA

Kalaangana is an interschool talents festival for children with special needs conducted by the Information and Resource Centre, Bangalore and Rotary District 3190. More than a 100 special schools participate in this 3 day event from all over Bangalore. This year the event was held between 27th to 29th November. Our children participated in dance, yoga, art among other activities.



NADAPRAYOGA - A 2 DAY MUSIC THERAPY WORKSHOP FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

On the 20th and 21st July, Dr. Meenakshi Ravi, Director of Meera Center for Music Therapy and Research and Dr. Geetha R. Bhat, Founder of Hamsakutira Foundation gave a comprehensive and practical guide on how music can be used as intervention. The event was supported by The Innerwheel Club of Bangalore, Vijayanagar. The 60 participants included special educators, teachers and parents. To make the program sustainable, we are guiding the participants to visit other special schools to practice music.



INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR ON LEARNING DISABILITY

We had the opportunity to conduct an International Seminar on Learning Disability on the 26th and 27th October 2018 in association with the University of Malta, National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities and Maria Special Education Services. The seminar was organized to bring a better understanding of learning disabilities in parents, special educators and mainstream school teachers with an objective to improve support for individuals with learning disabilities. We hosted three resource persons from Malta and one from Chennai.

The seminar was attended by 80 people comprising 20 parents from ASHA and the remaining were students studying to become special educators and mainstream school teachers as well as special educators.



EW INITIATIVES ATIVES

EARLY INTERVENTION TRAINING PROGRAM

The Early Intervention Training Program was inaugurated at the Assessment, Training and Guidance Centre which is the site for the project in June 2018. The program has 20 children with varied developmental conditions.

HIGHLIGHTS

- 20 children with learning problems including children with autism, learning disability and Down's syndrome were in the program.
- 3 months of training for mothers on the Portage Guide to Early Intervention was provided. The guide is a detailed manual on stages of development and steps for intervention.
- Therapies included speech therapy, physio therapy and parent counselling.

SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING PROGRAM



The Social Skills Training Program is supported by Adobe Foundation. The objective of the program is to build social skills - one of the primary deficits in autism. 12 children were a part of this program apart from 12 neurotypical children to promote communication and imitation.

HIGHLIGHTS

- 12 children with autism and 12 neurotypical children were a part of the program.
- Activities were conducted twice a month.
- Activities comprised story telling, gardening, visit to a restaurant, movie time.





GLOBAL AUTISM PROJECT

We have built a partnership with the Global Autism Project, USA to help our improve our services and delivery. The specialists visit us every 4 months, evaluate and provide feedback on how to improve the process.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The team has helped us improve our IEPs
- Address behaviour problems
- Focus and improve on communication
- Teaching methodology
- Teacher evaluations

Before the start of the training workshops for our parents, it was important to understand the needs of the family and the topics to be covered. The first session was initiated by our Director, Mrs. Jayashree Ramesh on 16th June and it was interesting and productive. The parents were divided into groups and asked to list out their concerns and topics they would like to be addressed. Both the moms and dads shared their interests and requirements. This meeting helped us to decide what sessions were actually required by the parents and a workshop schedule was prepared accordingly.





Child Development, 16 July 2018

Dr. Venkat Lakshmi, a professor from the Dept. of Human Development of Smt. VHD Home Science College, Bangalore, conducted a session on 'Child Development' on 16th July. The workshops helped parents of younger children with special needs from the early intervention program to gain an understanding on the developmental milestones and development through the years.

A parent had the following feedback about the workshop -

"The workshop has definitely helped me to better understand my child's areas of needs and gave many tips. It was also explained in Kannada using simple terms"



Parenting of Children with Special Needs, 26 July 2018

Being a parent is a tough job and being a parent of a special child is daunting. Dr. Venkat Lakshmi visited ASHA again to conduct a workshop on 'Parenting of Children with Special Needs' on 26th July and gave practical advice to cope with the demands of parenting.

Good Food for Disease Prevention, 5th August 2018

Parents often struggle with balancing nutrition and catering to their child's taste buds. Children with autism especially have rigid likes and dislikes regarding food and balancing nutrition is a tough task for parents and obesity is common. Dr. Raghu K.C. of Pristine Organics, spoke to the parents on 'Good Food for Disease Prevention' on 5th August. With his vast experience in creating diets for children with rare disorders, Dr. Raghu highlighted foods that are tasty as well as nutritious for the child and the parents.

Some of the common feedback about the session were 'fun and engaging'. We noticed many questions from parents on what's good and to improve their eating habits.





The Role of Medication in Children with Autism and ADD, 1 September 2018

Parents often are concerned about medication, how they work and the long term effects. Dr. Krishna Thalagavara, consultant psychiatrist at ASHA conducted a session on 'The Role of Medication in Children with Autism and ADD' for parents and professionals on 1st September.

He spoke on how medication is helpful in reducing some of the symptoms of autism and hyperactivity. He stressed on the importance of proper dosage and duration of medication and contraindications associated with medications.



Perception, 9th January 2019

On the 9th of January, a workshop on Perception was conducted by Mrs. Vani Nagaraj, Special Educator and Director of Aarohan – Centre for Special Education. Mrs. Vani spoke about how children with special needs perceive their environment. Perception can be visual, auditory and tactile and individuals with autism perceive them differently to neurotypicals. Individuals with autism are more literal and care has to be taken to avoid confusion.



Comprehension, 17 January 2019

The second workshop by Mrs. Vani Nagaraj was on Comprehension on 17th January. She gave a detailed account on difficulties in comprehension and understanding faced by individuals with autism and how to make worksheets, activities and instructions easy to understand.



Teaching Aids, 22nd January 2019

Ms. Nelie is from Netherlands and has been supporting ASHA since many years. She was a teacher and after retirement, visits ASHA to share her expertise in making teaching aids. On 22ndJanuary, Nelie conducted a workshop for parents on Creating Teaching Aids using simple household materials using old boxes, food containers and items likes buttons. The parents found the workshop to be very helpful, especially the parents of our early intervention section who are always looking to create aids that are colourful and captivating.



Accupressure and Colour Therapy, 27 January 2019

Alternate therapies have been successful as an intervention for autism. On 27th January, Dr. K. Basavaraj, MD, Head of Basava Healing Centre conducted a session for parents on Acupressure and Colour Therapy. Dr. Basavaraj explained how acupressure can bring positive results with absolutely no side effects.



Building Reading Skills, 30th January 2019

Mrs. Vani Nagaraj conducted a workshop on 30th January on Building Reading Skills in Children with Special Needs. Reading is an essential skill for anyone to function effectively in the environment. Mrs. Vani provided tips on how to encourage reading and build reading skills in the child through simple exercises.



Building Pre-Academic Skills, 7 February 2019

On 7th February, Mrs. Vani conducted a session on Building Pre Academic Skills for Children with Special Needs. Pre academic skills are skills that are a pre requisite for learning academics. These include matching, sorting, identification etc. The parents found the session useful as Mrs. Vani displayed detailed teaching aids.



Financial Planning for Families with Individuals with Special Needs, 17th February 2019

Managing finances and planning for a child with special needs is a pressing issue for parents of children with any special needs. To make this easier, Mr. Jitendra P.S. Solanki, a financial consultant, conducted an educational seminar on 17th February on Financial Planning for Families with Individuals with Special Needs. The parents also had one on sessions with Mr. Solanki and found the session very helpful.



PORTAGE TRAINING PROGRAM

As part of the early intervention program that we are conducting for lower income families with children with special needs, parents' training is an important component for a better outcome. Portage is a home based early intervention model having a series of activities that the child should be doing at different age levels. Ms. Suma Shastry, a trained Portage consultant conducted the sessions for 20 mothers for 2 weeks from 25th June in association with CBR Network South Asia.

The program was well received and the mothers were able to better understand how to address skill deficits in their children. We see more involvement of the mothers in the early intervention program.







GLOBAL AUTISM CONVENTION

ASHA was one among the 12 partner organizations to conduct the Global Autism Convention. The event was organized at the St. John's College Hospital Auditorium from the 10th to 12th December 2018. the partner organizations include National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Intellectual Disabilities, Assisted Living for Autistic Adults, CBR Network, Disability Convention NGOs Alliance, Karnataka Parents Association for Mentally Retarded Citizens, Parivaar, Rotary District 3190, Shristi Special Academy, Spastics Society of Karnataka, St. John's College Hospital and Sunshine Autism Trust.



The event was attended by nearly 600 participants including international delegates. We hosted 40 national and international speakers who presented on a range of topics ranging from diagnosis, assessments, intervention, role of siblings, assisted living, role of Government, self advocacy and employment and vocational training.





GLOBAL AUTISM CONVENTION

Dr. Shoba Srinath, Retd. Professor of Psychiatry, NIMHANS was the Chairperson of the Convention, Dr. Ashok Mysore, Psychiatrist, St. John's College Hospital headed the Scientific Committee and the Director of ASHA, Mrs. Jayashree Ramesh was the Secretary of the Organising Committee.



The event was well received by the participants and the general feedback received was encouraging.

One of the participants, Dr. K.S. Vijayalekshmy said:

"The convention was good and we got information regarding what is happening in the field of autism around the world."



SPORTS MEET

ASHA celebrated its Annual Sports Meet at Vidya Vardhaka Sangha School grounds, Rajajinagar on the 6th of October. The event was supported by the volunteers from Oracle headed by Mr. Hariharan Srinivasan, Secretary, Oracle Volunteers and Rotary Bangalore West.

The children participated in many activities such as running, yoga, march past, exercise, putting the ring on the object, aiming at an object,

The app also has a detailed list of organizations in India conducting assessments, interventions and day schooling.

The app can help parents as well as the general public to gain an understanding of autism and be aware of the signs and symptoms of the condition.
