LIVELIHOOD

Livelihoods in rural Maharashtra, as in many other parts of India, are primarily based on agriculture and allied activities. However, the specific nature of livelihoods can vary depending on the region, climate, and socio-economic conditions. VSP has engaged in Agriculture allied activities, Animal husbandry such as livestock rearing, Agro-processing such as establishing jaggery mills, flour mills that adds value to the agricultural products,

Involving in various Government Schemes: The government of Maharashtra, as well as the central government of India, implement various rural development schemes and employment guarantee programs like the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) to provide rural employment and improve livelihoods.

VSP has been working to working to improve rural livelihoods, address agricultural challenges, and promote sustainable practices to enhance the well-being of rural communities in the state.



20 women self-help groups from 10 villages in the Bhatkuli division through a rural development project in Kharpan Patta. The training appears to have been comprehensive and covered several crucial aspects of entrepreneurship.

The topics covered, including group formation, group record keeping, identifying problems in the market, prerequisites for starting and selling a business, are all essential for any entrepreneur, and particularly for women in rural areas.

Overall, such training programs can play a vital role in empowering women in rural areas to become entrepreneurs and contribute to the local economy. By equipping them with the necessary knowledge and skills, these programs can help break down barriers and promote gender equality in entrepreneurship



Implementation of free chemical farming in 10 villages in the Bhatkuli block by Holistic Rural Development Projects (HRDP) and VSP was important step towards sustainable agriculture practices and environmental conservation.

Organic tomato farming activities was implemented, and farmers were given guidance on planting them. 50 beneficiaries who were already registered under the Organic Certification process, the initiative was a positive impact on the livelihoods of these farmers.

It is also encouraging to know that marketing experts and the Kisan Farmers ICS group provided technical support to help the farmers get better market prices for their organic farming tomatoes. This support turned out to be crucial in ensuring that the farmers earn a fair income for their produce.



Covid-19 pandemic has had an adverse effect on the health situation in rural areas, particularly for women and children. The decline in haemoglobin levels among women in the salinity belt was concerning.

Edelgive Foundation supported the implementation of the Parisar Poshan Baug campaign, which emphasised growing of organic, nutritious, and chemical-free vegetables to improve the health and income of people in rural areas.

The campaign has had positive impacts on the health of families, as shown by the 90% increment in hemoglobin levels after consuming organic vegetables. Such initiatives are crucial for creating a more sustainable and healthy future for all.



Under the HRDP Project, VSP took a significant step by distributing Desi Tur Seeds to establish a chemical-free Tur Cluster on 150 acres of land in Bhatkuli. This intervention did not not only benefit the farmers but also contribute to sustainable agriculture practices. By avoiding the use of chemicals, the farmers produced organic tur that meets the growing demand for organic products. Furthermore, the initiatives taken by VSP helped establish direct linkages between private players and farmers.

Registering the farmers in the Organic Certification process by APPEDA was a commendable move as it ensured that their organic produce meets the required standards.

Overall, these interventions and strategies implemented by VSP demonstrate a commitment to promoting sustainable agriculture.



Adline Castelino and Vikas Sahyog Pratishthan collaborated to distribute farm equipment to women farmers in Sangrampur taluka. The provision of a tool for sowing to 140 women was a significant step towards empowering them and improving their agricultural practices. The support provided by Adline Castelino and Vikas Sahyog Pratishthan to the female farmers was commendable.

By equipping them with the necessary tools, women are able to overcome challenges and achieve better outcomes in their farming activities. It not only enhances their livelihoods but also promotes gender equality and inclusive development in rural areas.



The study conducted by Jain Irrigation Systems on modern and emerging technologies for producer company members and experimental farmers in Jalgaon's Bhatkuli cluster showcased a commitment to providing valuable knowledge and support to farmers. During the two-day program, the farmers were informed about various aspects of onion planting, including pre-sowing information and the estimated time required for harvesting onions from the sowing stage.

The study also addressed the importance of time and land management, highlighting strategies that enable farmers to make the most efficient use of their resources.

Jain Irrigation Systems is empowering farmers with valuable insights and practices that can enhance their agricultural productivity, reduce costs, and promote sustainability.



The unveiling of "Poshan Mala" under the organic farming initiative initiated by VSP at Kalambaste, on the land owned by Maheshwar Mandal in Ratnagiri, is a significant achievement. The concept of 'Poshan Mala' focuses on multi-layered and biodiversity-based organic products.

VSP has embarked on a farming experiment that aims to showcase the benefits of organic farming, perennial crops, and premium products. This initiative not only promotes sustainable agriculture but also encourages dialogue among individuals interested in organic farming.

This event served as a platform to showcase the positive impact of organic farming and the potential of multi-layered and biodiversity-based cultivation.





The training on solar dryers and the preparation of onion powder using these dryers is an excellent initiative. Solar dryers offer several advantages over traditional sun drying and electric dryers.


Solar dryers enable farmers to dry their produce in a controlled environment, protecting it from contaminants and adverse weather conditions.

This demonstrates their initiative and commitment to value addition in agriculture. Manufacturing onion powder can extend the shelf life of onions and provide a value-added product that can fetch better prices in the market.





EDUCATION



VSP has improved rural education in Maharashtra by adopting a holistic, needs-based approach, emphasizing skills, knowledge, ethics, and values. Our pedagogy focuses on individual child development, fostering community growth.

We have implemented this through age-appropriate teaching, bridging social and financial literacy gaps, promoting financial inclusiveness, fostering youth leadership and by especially addressing girls' school dropout rates.

For the year 2022-2023 VSP has been able to reach out to almost 21.000 children in Maharashtra .



As part of the Model school project a visit to the MIDC police station and Ahmednagar Child line office was informative and engaging. It was commendable that the child parliament members got to interact with Mr. Yuvraj Athre, Assistant Police Inspector from MIDC police station, and Mr. Mahesh & Pooja from Child line organisation.

Overall, such exposure visits can play a crucial role in promoting awareness and understanding of child rights and can empower children to become active agents of change in their communities.





Under the HRDP Project, HDFC Bank CSR distributed Smart Digital Boards to 12 villages of Zilla Parishad Schools in the Bhandara Tumsar Block. This initiative by HDFC Bank demonstrated their commitment to supporting education in rural areas. The efforts in implementing activities in these villages and striving to provide the best opportunities for children in schools was commendable.

The presence of various stakeholders, including SMC members, VDC members, Sarpanch, and VSP members during the activity, showcased collaborative and collective support towards improving education in rural Maharashtra. 

VSP and NSEF extended their support to renovate and rebuild the primary schools affected by Cyclone Nisarga in 2020. It was crucial to ensure that children's rights are protected, especially their right to education. By investing in the reconstruction of the damaged schools, VSP and NSEF have demonstrated their commitment to providing children with a conducive learning environment.

The concept of model schools, where the primary aim is to foster a love for learning and encourage children to attend school, was commendable by creating an engaging and supportive atmosphere, these schools can help students develop a genuine interest in education and facilitate their educational journey. With the help of this campaign, we were all able to spread awareness among 3000 people. VSP acknowledges and appreciates the efforts of NSEF for their continuous support in such initiatives.



SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION

Soil and water conservation is essential in the state of Maharashtra, India, as it faces various challenges related to land degradation, water scarcity, and environmental sustainability. Here are some of the key initiatives taken by VSP to cater to these issues:

Improving soil health, and promoting sustainable agriculture practices by Soil testing and nutrient management that is important for maintaining soil fertility and preventing erosion.

By constructing contour trenches, check dams, and bunds, runoff is slowed down and allowed to percolate into the soil, which recharges groundwater and reduces soil erosion.

Afforestation and Agroforestry: Planting trees and promoting agroforestry practices helps in stabilizing the soil, reducing erosion, and improving water retention. Trees also contribute to increased biodiversity and provide valuable products for farmers.

Engaging local communities in the planning and implementation of conservation measures is vital. Inclusion of self-help groups play an active role in the management of natural resources. and Creating awareness among farmers about the benefits of conservation practices and providing training on sustainable agriculture techniques is crucial for their adoption.





Vikas Sahyog Pratishthan is implementing the HRDP project and working towards improving soil quality in Kharpan Patta in Amravati. Proper diagnosis of soil is indeed crucial for identifying the right treatment and improving crop productivity.

Testing the soil quality and sharing the report with farmers, along with the guidance from Ms. Pranali Deshmukh from the agriculture department, is a commendable initiative. It has enabled farmers to better understand the nutrient and mineral content of their soil, and accordingly, make informed decisions about crop selection and land management practices.

This intervention has not only positively impacted the quality of land and soil, but also led to an increase in organic crop production, which is excellent for both the environment and the farmers' livelihoods.



VSP conducted soil testing on farmers' land as part of the organic certification process.

VSP provided training to farmers in the villages of Wathoda, Waki, Nirul, Uttemsara, Saur, Udapur, and Mhasipur on taking soil samples. This training equipped farmers with the necessary skills to collect accurate soil samples, ensuring reliable test results. By involving farmers in the process, VSP promotes a participatory approach and empowers them to actively engage in sustainable farming practices.

Soil testing helps farmers understand the nutrient deficiencies or imbalances present, enabling them to tailor their fertilizer application to meet the specific needs of their crops. This targeted approach not only enhances crop productivity but also minimizes the potential negative impact on the environment through excessive fertilizer use.



BRLF Intervention Review team visited Dharni Cluster. It was good to know that Senior Program Executive Mr. Ramesh facilitated the convergence inputs session with the VSP team and visited various interventions related to soil and water conservation, such as Nala Deeping, Graded Bunding, Soil Bunding, Deep CCT work, and New Well Construction.

It was shared that VSP team's efforts in implementing these interventions, will help conserve water and increase agricultural production, ultimately benefiting the tribal beneficiaries in the project areas. The team interacted with NTFP, agriculture, and livestock-related beneficiaries to enhance livelihood opportunities through this intervention. The BRLF Intervention Review team had a positive experience and witnessed the positive impact of VSP's interventions in the area.



.Mr. Umesh Rathod from VSP was trained to develop Livestock nurses, to improve the management and provide first aid to livestock at a rate and at a low cost.Community owned goat milk processing and establishing "Meat Bank" to ensure nutrition, health and regular income.





Rahul Khadse (Program Director) was selected for the Basic Leadership Development Course (BLDC) which was held from 19th to 24th September in Vietnam.

Patil and Vaishali Dr. Dilip Panderpatte met with activists from Bhatukali Amravati to discuss farming implementing organic They projects. stressed the importance of collaboration, gender equality, and well-defined plans. Consideration of beneficiary selection criteria and addressing farmer challenges were also key points.
