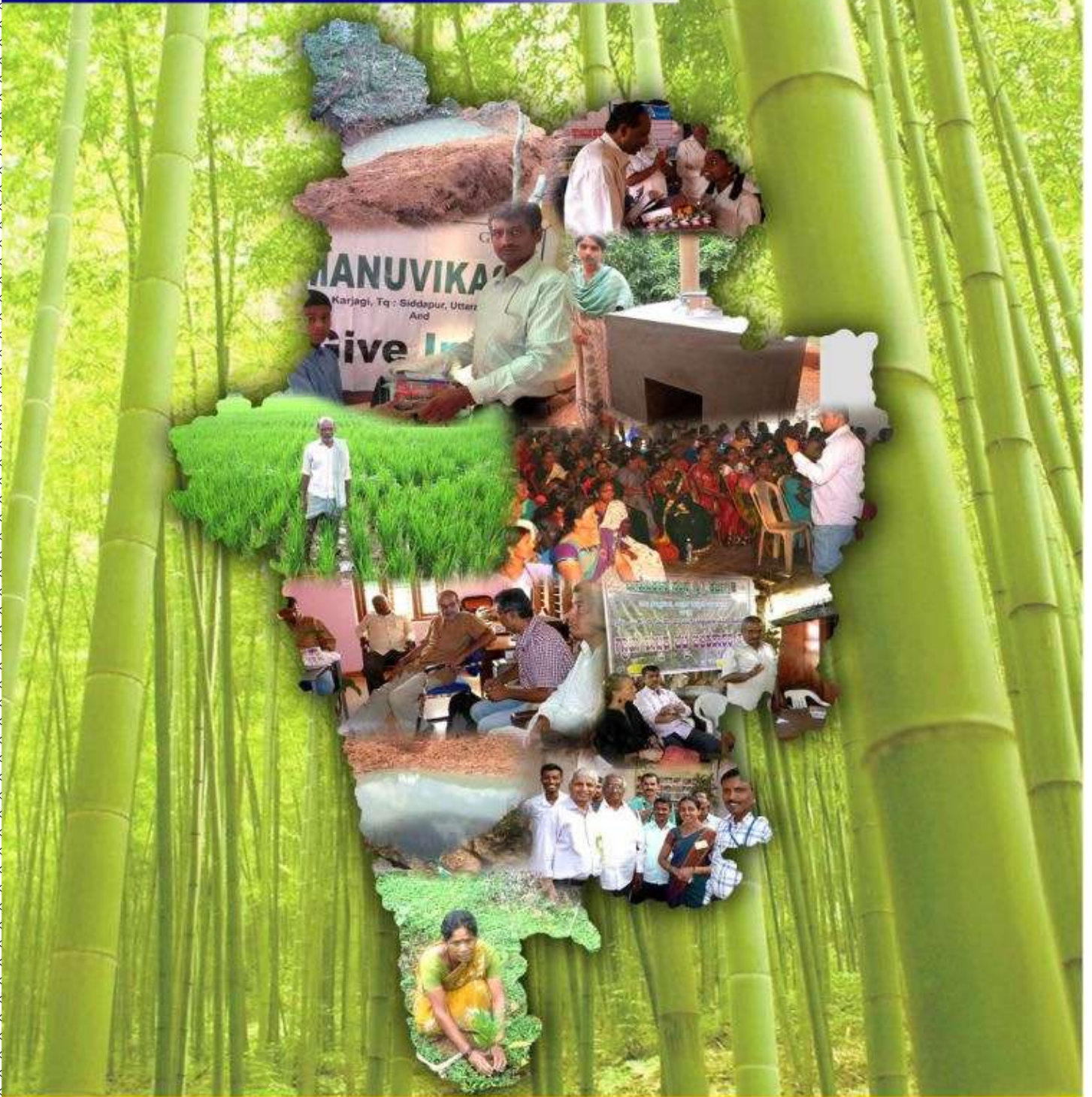

From the desk of the director

It is very exciting to review the progress made during this year and MANUVIKASA is again able to demonstrate its efficiency in implementing livelihood and education development activities in rural areas. This year we have expanded our activities from two taluqs to four Taluqs and adopted few new programmes such as micro finance, Betta Land development programmes, scaling of Sustainable Rice Intensification and development of red rice and its marketing. We can confidently and loudly declare that we crossed 500 numbers in terms of development of small tanks. We have brought smile on the faces of more than 1200 farmers and they are getting more than 40% of extra yield after MANUVIKASA's intervention.

We are able to collect community contribution for about 40% of our total budget and most of our programmes are getting converted into revenue models. We are happy to share that MANUVIKASA is able to reach more than 500 poor and orphan children by providing basic necessary materials and learning materials to continue their education. This year we have started English and environment science education class in few government schools of Siddapur Taluq with the help of foreign volunteers. This programme has added enthusiasm in the rural children and helps them to experience a new culture and learn the language.

My heartily thank to Deshpande Foundation (DF) for their financial and mentorship support to develop four hundred plus tanks and reach 1200 farmers. Scaling up of Sustainable Rice Intensification (SRI) practices to 300 farmers has possible only after DF's continues technical and manpower support.

We thank to Give India for providing monthly donation to reach orphan and poor children to help them to continue education and develop tanks to the very poor communities. Our system of accountability and credibility is improved up to desire levels with the support of Give India and Credibility Alliance.

This year we have scaled our environment conservation and bio-diversity conservation effort with the support of UNDP SGP and CEE. We have developed more than 10,000 nursery saplings of globally threatened and endangered species. We have helped poor Self Help Group members to

construct energy efficient Choolas with the support of SGP project. I heartily thank to UNDP SGP team who sanctioned and supporting Betta Land conservation programme. This year we are able to get CSR grants from Canara Bank to provide education and basic necessity materials to the needy children of our working area. I heartily thank to Canara Bank for their help.

I thank to my high school friend and founder of Green Army Trust Mr. Adarsh (USA) who helped us to develop few tanks in our working area.

I sincerely thank to our board members who timely given their advice and suggestions to deliver quality service from the organization. They also helped me to develop organization strategy and policies. Last but not least I thank our team members who have taken all deliverables with challenge and achieved more than set target.

INTRODUCTION TO THE ORGANIZATION

MANUVIKASA is a non-governmental, non-political, voluntary organization committed for the advancement of education, environment and rural folk. It was registered in the year 2003 and working in Haveri and Uttara Kannada districts of Karnataka, India. The board is consisted with the members from different walks of life like social workers, educationists, accountants and agriculturists. The organization is addressing the issues like alleviation of poverty, awareness activities on different social problems; publicize human rights and child rights, employment creation, proper management of natural resource and various other issues for rural development.

Vision

Development of sustainable livelihood, improve education, enriched environment and development of good human values.

Mission

To create and sustain a social order among the marginalized and deprived members of the rural community regardless of caste, class, creed and gender with special emphasis on women and children, enabling them through various programmes and activities ensuring sustainable livelihood, distribution of natural resources without discrimination.



OBJECTIVES OF THE ORGANIZATION:

The Main objectives:

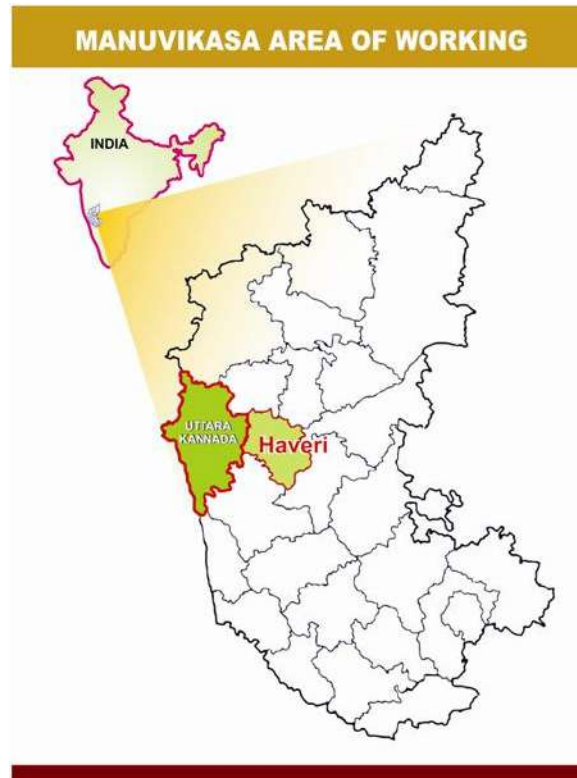
- ✳ To undertake the preservation of the natural resources mainly land, water, vegetation to sustain life on this planet by maintaining ecosystem and to prevent exploitation of these resources by some section of the society and ensuring equitable distribution to the basic need of all, especially the poor.
- ✳ Care and service for the educational, economic, environmental, cultural needs, welfare and well being of all persons residing in India irrespective of Caste, Creed, Race, Sex, language or religion and more specifically downtrodden, economically backward rural folk living below the poverty line in particular with prejudice.

Other Objectives:

- ✳ To reduce poverty and promote community economic development through rural credit particularly to women, landless labourers and other disadvantaged groups through income/ employment generation rural enterprise promotion and better health care promotion with focus on dalits, lambani tribals, shepherds and Muslim minority communities.
- ✳ To improve rural livelihood through sustainable management and development of natural resources and promotion of improved environment friendly agricultural practice.
- ✳ Working with communities to assist and empower women in target groups to develop community based structures and organizations with self help concept with special emphasis on development of women and developing local women as SHG leaders, members of village Grama Panchayath and in other local level institutions.
- ✳ Working in co-operation with other local agencies & government departments, which are concerned for meeting the needs of the target groups in different ways and establishing operational links with such agencies.
- ✳ To initiate research and development projects with community participation, that ultimately aims to influence the reduction of incidence of poverty, child labour and environmental destruction.

AREA OF OPERATION:

MANUVIKASA is working in two districts of Karnataka State viz., Uttara Kannada and Haveri.



Uttara Kannada is a special district among other districts of Karnataka. The area here consists of coastal area, hilly region and plateau. This is a district with a forest cover of over 81 percent. As such, the district of Uttara Kannada has least density of population in the state, because a large area of land is classified as forests. The district can be divided into four eco zones i.e., the coastal, the crest line of Western Ghats, the high land area and the eastern plateau. The species of plants, soil varieties, flora and fauna are diversified from one place to other. The public is depended on agriculture, fishery and collection of forest products. Now many species of wild plants are under endangered situation. Due to the strict implementation of forest laws, the people who collect forest products are finding very difficult for their livelihood.

The organization is working in semi arid rural zones of Haveri district. It is the tropical region. The tanks in the district are silted and hence source of water for drinking and agriculture purpose was very less. Prime source of income here is agriculture only, which was also bitterly beaten. In such situation, when food and drinking water availability was totally absent, education became second priority for the Public. This was challenging for the work of MANUVIKASA. Main crops here are Jowar, Ragi, which demand less water. Even these crops were suffered from lack of water. There are very poor water sources in the district due to lack of channels & rivers, which are potentials of increasing ground water level. Due to this condition, people get migrated to various other places in search of food security and drinking water. Even in this 21st century child marriage, child labour, child trafficking etc. social evils have found their own place in the life style of people in Haveri district.

Achievements 2013-14

Environment conservation and Livelihood Development

Ground water resources are restricted, site specific and limited. Few years ago groundwater was supposed to be a safe water source but due to anthropogenic activities, this resource is on the verge of depletion. More and more ground water is consumed for domestic, agricultural and industrial sector. The use of ground water beyond its recharge capacity is posing threat to this resource. The over exploitation resulted in the lowering of ground water table by several hundred feet thus becoming more expensive to harvest it. Ground water resources built up in large time span but are exhausted in much shorter time span. It is necessary to recharge these resources with care and long term management of the resources with the help of advanced technology.

“SAVE EACH DROP OF WATER, IT SAVES YOU”. Keeping faith in this thought MANUVIKASA is developing water harvesting structures mainly for the recharge of ground water table with the support of Deshpande foundation, UNDP SGP and Give India. Irrigation and drinking purposes are also fulfilled through these structures. In the year 2013-14 the number of such structures is increased to 500 in Sirsi, Siddapur, Yallapur and Mundgod Taluqs of Uttara Kannada district. In the reporting year the contribution from farmer’s side is increased and the contribution from MANUVIKASA is decreased. Hence this project is becoming revenue model.

Deshpande Foundation is the largest donor to this programme and this Foundation has provided support to scale the activities and helped us to mobilize the community contribution. They are providing mentorship support and training to administrative and field level staff members. They have given excavator for tank development in the month of March-2014 to reach more number of beneficiaries.

After tank development more than 60% of the farmers are growing second crop. We observe that expansion of the agriculture land is increased and most of the waste land converted in to agriculture land. Horticulture crop, vegetables and water intensive crop is increasing. Surrounding open and tube wells are recharging.

Small investment big impact (Case Study)

Shreedhar Subray Bhat is a small farmer living in Bilagi village of Siddaur Taluq, Uttara Kannada District, Karnataka. He is having 3 acres of land and growing paddy, areca nut and vegetables. His main crop is paddy. He was facing problem of water and was able to grow only one paddy crop per year. He approached MANUVIKASA in June 2013 after reading tank development related report in local news paper and developed a small pond in his farm with the support of MANUVIKASA and he invested Rs. 4000 to this pond. MANUVIKASA spent around Rs. 3500 on this structure. He had good water storage in the small tank even in summer.

MANUVIKASA's staff members advised him to grow two paddy crops in a year along with vegetables through trainings and field days. Now he is able to grow 2 paddy crops per year and he is growing this crop in 1.5 acres of land. He is growing vegetables in 0.5 acres of land after tank development. His yield in horticulture crop is increased up to 25%. He is getting around Rs. 12000 extra income after construction of this pond. He is thankful to MANUVIKASA for their assistance in developing this water harvesting structure. He was purchasing vegetables in market and now he is selling the vegetables and his four members' family is enjoying with self grown organic vegetables.



Give Water to the Farmers, They Feed the Nation (Case Study)

Manjunath Naik is a small farmer living in Gattikai village of Siddapur Taluq of Uttara Kannada District, Karnataka. He is having one acre of land and was growing one paddy crop per year that too in a great pressure of water scarcity. He heard about MANUVIKASA's tank development work through his wife who is a member in a SHG initiated by MANUVIKASA. He approached MANUVIKASA in 2012 and sacrificed his one and half gunta land for the development of tank. Also he invested Rs. 4000 on this pond. MANUVIKASA invested Rs. 3500 and developed it. Now he has got sufficient water in his tank.

MANUVIKASA's staff imparted training on SRI paddy cultivation and he adopted it perfectly. Now he has become master farmer and advising other farmers to adopt SRI system in paddy cultivation. When compared yield in his farm from 2009 to 2012 it has increased by 3 quintal. Now he is growing paddy two times in a year using SRI method which requires less water. Besides he is growing vegetables and has called back his son who was working in city. Now all the family members are engaged in agricultural work and are self-reliant. They all thank MANUVIKASA for their upliftment.



Save Each Drop Of Water, It SAVES YOU. (Case Study)

Divakar Subray Hegde, Bappanalli is a small farmer of Sirsi Taluq, Uttara Kannada district. Being a member of farming family he continued growing paddy and areca nut in the traditional method in his 1.75 ha land. It required a huge quantity of water which was a problem for him. Also he was not able to increase his yield in

that land. In the meanwhile he came in contact with MANUVIKASA through staff members who had gone to his village for survey work. He got support from MANUVIKASA to develop a tank of size 30x30x10 feet in his own land. For this he invested Rs. 4000 and MANUVIKASA's contribution was Rs. 3500. In this tank he got good quantity of water.

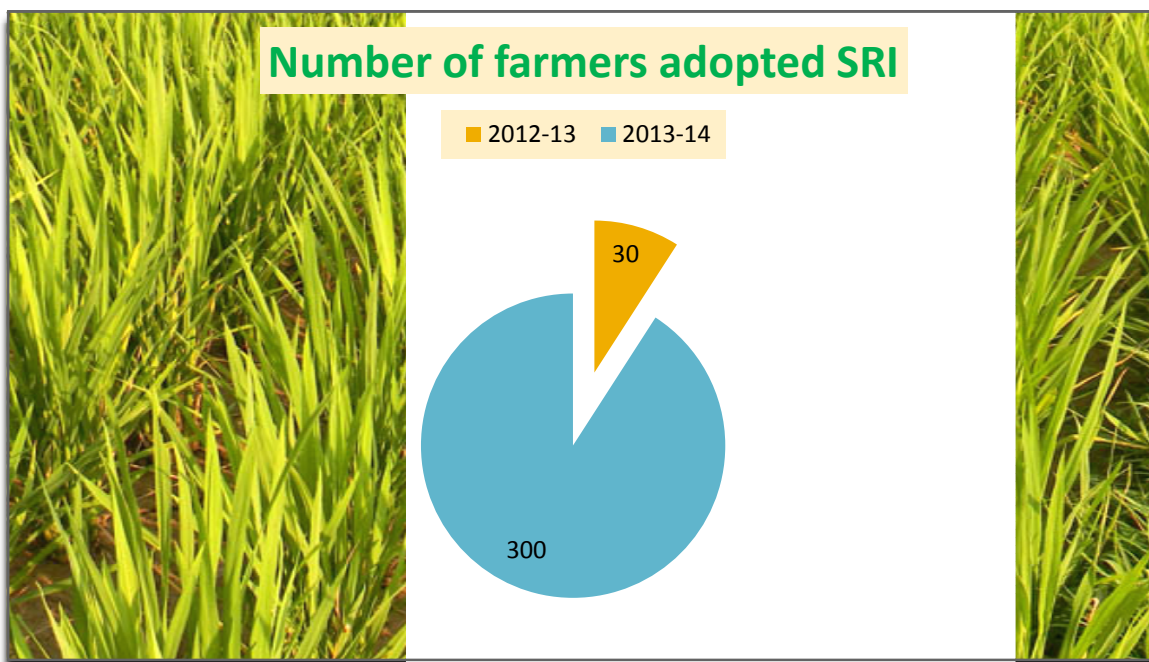
MANUVIKASA's staff imparted training on SRI paddy cultivation which requires very less amount of water. He implemented it in his farm and got positive result. His paddy yield increased from 50 quintals to 65 quintals. Now he is growing two crops in a year with the help of tank water. Also he is doing apiculture through which he is getting supplementary income. His horticulture crop got water through this tank and income is increased by 20%. For his dairy farming he is growing grass with the help of tank water. Agro forestry is increased. Besides he is growing vegetables for self and marketing purpose. His family has got food security through this. He has become model farmer and is guiding others to have more income through agriculture. He thanks MANUVIKASA for all support given to him.



System of Rice Intensification

MANUVIKASA is helping farmers to conserve the rain water in one hand and assisting them to use this water in sustainable way in other hand. SRI (System of Rice Intensification) method is useful for the

farmers to grow more yields with less use of water. Seed treatment, nursery of seedlings, spacing, alternate wetting and drying, weeding, apply of manure and bio-pesticides and harvesting method will be imparted in training and field visits to the farmers.



Training and field demonstration were conducted in 19 villages of the working area and covered 474 farmers. Last year successful farmers were acted as resource farmers to achieve this big number. Farmers feel that 30 to 40% of the yield increased after adoption of SRI method.

Instead of growing normal rice, MANUVIKASA informed the farmers to grow red rice which is having medicinal value. In co-ordination with Sahaja organic growers association, Bengaluru MANUVIKASA distributed red rice seeds to the farmers and helped them in marketing the yield. It has proved a very good income to the farmers. This effort is helping to conserve disappearing indigenous seeds.

Farmers coming together to share experience with each other

Indian agriculture is dominated by small and marginal farmers. Farmers are basically scientists and fields are their laboratory. Each interested farmer always does one or the other experiment in his field. Most of the times the experiment based on his experience gives very good result and improves yield. But this information remains within him and will not spread to other farming community. To share the innovative idea, MANUVIKASA helped farmers of Sirsi and Siddapur taluqs in attending “Krishi Sinchana”, a farmers’ meet, held at Deshpande Foundation, Hubli in the month of January 2014. Some of them won “The Best Farmer” award for the good work they have done in their fields. Various farmers from North Karnataka attended the function and it helped all of them in the exchange of ideas related to field reality.

Another opportunity our farmers got to exchange their innovative idea was field day. On 20-11-2013 a field day was organized in Mudalli village of Siddapur taluq. Dr. Mallanna Nagaral, a developed farmer from Bagalkot district held the concentration of whole farming community of that place through his excellent speech. He stressed the importance of agriculture. His experience stories, related poems and style of speech impressed all of them especially the young generation. Ms. Roopa Patil from Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Sirsi along with her team members attended the function and guided the farmers on various diseases, their reasons and solutions related to different type of yields. Dr. Neelam Maheshwari, Grant Director of Deshpande foundation attended as chief guest and distributed awards to some innovative farmers. She appreciated the young farmers who are coming forward for agricultural work instead of going to cities in search of job. Mr. Sanjeev Kulakarni, Deshpande foundations, Dr. R. Vasudev, Professor, Forestry College, Sirsi, Ms. Mahadevi Gowda, President, Taluq Panchayath were attended the function.

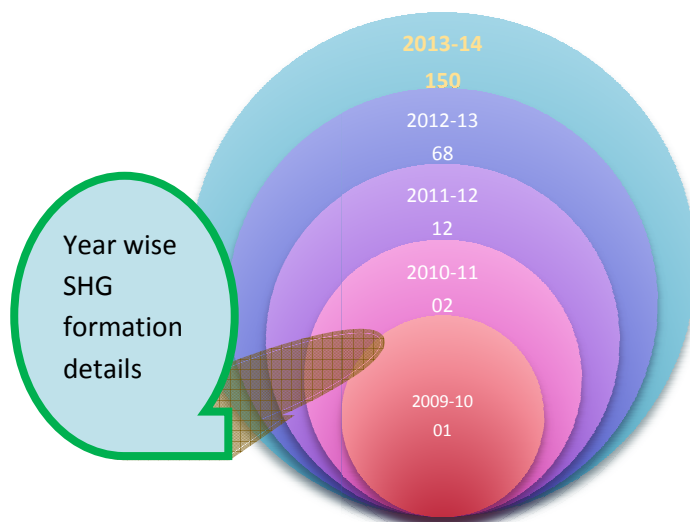


Women Empowerment

In a quote from current UN-Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, we’re reminded; “Countries with more gender equality have better economic growth. Companies with more women leaders perform better. Peace agreements that include women are more durable. Parliaments with more women enact more legislation on key social issues such as health, education, anti-discrimination, and child support. The evidence is clear: equality for women means progress for all”. MANUVIKASA is forming Self Help Groups for women members in rural and small cities to empower poor women in economic, social, spiritual and political field. So far the organization has formed 233 SHGs through which women members are becoming empowered. In these groups, members save a definite amount of money each month and after six months they use this capital for lending purpose. Also 65 SHGs are linked with bank loan. Most of them have invested this loan into income generation activities and loan recovery is also very good.





On 10.08.2013, loan distribution programme to the SHG members was held at Shankar Math, Siddapur with the collaboration of State Bank of Mysore. SBM Assistant General Manager Sri. Narasimha Bhat inaugurated the programme and stressed the importance of savings enhancement and income generation activities of the SHGs. He distributed loan sanction letters to 23 SHGs and 5.88 lac loan disbursed during the programme. Zilla Panchayath member Mr. Iswar Naik, SBM Siddapur branch Manager Mr. Deepak Kumar had present during the programme.



On 23.03.2014 the loan distribution programme was held at Shri Shankarmath, Siddapur. Mr. K. Narasimha Bhat, AGM, State Bank of Mysore, Karwar attended the function as a chief guest. He appreciated the women members those who have taken loan and repaying properly. Also he suggested the delegates to construct strong forum through their SHGs to solve every problem they face. In the programme 30 SHGs were given loan sanction letter and 280 women SHG members attended the programme. Total 13.71 lac loan disbursed during the programme.



“SHG (Self Help Group) women are very prompt in repayment of loan. MANUVIKASA is a very good NGO working in rural area and head of this NGO is also living with local community and able to respond their problems immediately. MANUVIKASA is bringing the dream of financial inclusion into reality by forming more and more SHGs and introducing credit worthy poor community members to our bank. We are ready to give loan to the poor to improve their livelihood. SHG members should use the loan amount for income generating activities and improve their earnings. Bankers should treat all uneducated and poor customers with respect because they are more prompt.”

MANUVIKASA has collaborated with MicroGraam Social Development Foundation to support income generation activities of poor women through micro loans. MicroGraam is a peer-to-peer lending platform that empowers rural entrepreneurs with access loans from socially minded investors. MicroGraam provide affordable, micro-loans to rural poor who have not otherwise access to financial services. MicroGraam also try to develop innovative solutions to provide the lowest-costing credit to its borrowers. They collaborate with small, local non-profit organizations that work closely with the communities to provide micro-loans and other supportive services. MANUVIKASA has taken 17 lac loans from MicroGraam and given micro loans to 103 members to encourage income generation activities like dairy, construction of wells, purchase of sewing machine and petty shops etc.

MANUVIKASA is providing micro insurance to the SHG members through Janashree Bima Yojana Scheme LIC of India. Policy holder has to pay Rs. 100 per year and get Rs. 30000 insurance benefit for normal death and Rs. 75000 for accidental death and accidental disability.

Every year MANUVIKASA conducts SHG federation meetings and women conventions in all the clusters of the working area. This year MANUVIKASA had conducted federation meetings cum women conventions in Bilagi, Kansur, Siddapur, Hosur and Kolsirsi Clusters. In the same time scholarships have given to their children. Issues related to women and low, government schemes, bank finance and proper SHG management issues were discussed during the programme. Local elected members, school teachers, government officials were the guests to the programme.





Stitching continued (Case Study)

Parvati Hegde is a fifty three years old thin lady living with her two children and husband in Kansur village of Siddapur Taluq. She is a member of Kalika Bhavani Self Help Group (SHG) which is promoted by MANUVIKASA. Her husband is working as temporary postman in nearby village and she is doing tailoring work. She suffers from immense Leucoderma disease and most of her income goes in vain for her medical expenses . Major part of the income of her husband is spent for his own expenditures and a very small amount will be contributed to the family. Her two girl children are rank holders and are securing more than 92 percent in all exams. Three years back when she joined Self Help Group, she had lost confidence in her life and was in a course of acute depression. Other members of the Self Help Group developed her confidence level and supported her to develop her tailoring business. She has got INR 15000 loan from SHG and INR 15000 from MANUVIKASA –Micrograam to develop her business. Before joining the group, she was having one tailoring machine and now she is having two machines and she has hired a lady for her support. She is also selling ladies dresses and her monthly income increased from 2000 to 6000 plus. She has improved customer base with the help of SHG. Her

leadership quality is improved and she started tailoring training to other local unemployed girl youths.

Her children are getting scholarships from MANUVKASA and she is confidently sending her children to high school and college education. Her elder child Ruchita has passed SSLC examination with distinction and joined science education so that Parvati's monthly expense is increasing and she is planning to increase the volume of the business. She is praising Kalikamba SHG and MANUVIKASA for developing her confidence in the life and improves her income with small loan support. She has started saving of INR 50 per month in SHG and now increased to INR 100.



Bio-Diversity conservation and Betta Land Development

The Western Ghats are recognized as one of the twelve megabiodiversity places of the world. The Western Ghat forest lands are of national and global importance for ecological balance, biodiversity and the supply of natural resources. Uttara Kannada District is situated in heart of the Western Ghats and which is rich in forest as well as in bio-

diversity. Uttar Kannada district has least density of population in the state because large area of land is covered by the forests. But Most of the forest area is cleared due to Dams, Factories and atomic energy lines. Remaining forest area is divided in to three categories such as Wild Life Sanctuaries, Reserved forest and Minor Forest. Total area of the Uttara Kannada District is 10224.85 Square Kilo Meters and considerable area of the District is covered by Betta Land. The area of the Betta Land is 513.401 Square Kilo Meters. These Betta Lands or leafy forests are rapidly degrading due to commercial composting with large scale and continuous clearing of forest floors and unscientific collection of NTFPs and poaching of timbers.

What is Betta Land?

Betta land is dominated by moist deciduous and evergreen forest type. Bettaland (Leafy Forest) legally belongs to forest department and handed over to community for collection of bark leaves and NTFP materials.

MANUVIKASA is implementing a project with the collaboration of UNDP SGP project with the help of CEE (Centre for Environment and Education) named **“Conservation of Rare, Endangered and Threatened species in fast degrading Betta Land through protection of species, plant enrichment and wetland creation in Siddapur Taluq of North Kanara District.”**

What do we want to achieve?

In this project MANUVIKASA focuses both on improving the ecological and economic conditions of the Betta Land. The objectives of this project will contribute to the government's goals to promote economic growth, reduce poverty and protect the environment. The objectives are:

- Study, assess and evaluate the degradation of Betta Land and develop a sustainable management plan.
- Collaboration with forest department and government programs focused on forest conservation and restoration.
- Lobby and use of media to create more political awareness concerning protecting the Betta Land.
- Stimulate enforcement of legislation for protecting the Betta Land.
- Development of sustainable business model for local communities that also can be used in other areas.
- Conservation of rare, endangered and threatened IUCN species in Betta Land.
- Planting and sustainable management of NTFP, foliage and fodder species and medicinal plants.
- Development of water harvesting structure for soil and water conservation.
- Regenerate Betta Land through plant enrichment, control soil erosion and rain water harvesting.
- Capacity building of communities for preserving biodiversity, improve food security and economic development.
- Women empowerment through supporting Self Help Groups (SHG's).
- Promotion of energy efficient Choolas (Closed stoves) for more efficient use of fire wood.

We have developed 63 tanks in this reporting period and helped 31 women members to construct energy efficient choolas.

MANUVIKASA when entered village for organizing self help groups, it came to know about semi orphan and orphan children. These children who have lost both of their parents or lost one among them are facing problem to get basic necessities to continue their education. MANUVIKASA designed a programme to provide these children with necessary materials like blanket, bed sheet, towels, casual dresses, toilet soaps, washing soaps, comb, hair oil, notebooks, pens, pencils, dictionary and grammar books etc. In this reporting year MANUVIKASA has helped 122 children. This year MANUVIKASA has distributed scholarships for 119 school going children under JBY group insurance scheme.

Give India is the major donor for this programme. Give India is a donation platform that allows people to support a cause of their choice. About 3000 NGOs around the nation reviewed and finally 200 NGOs listed as per credibility and transparency norms. MANUVIKASA has guided Suvarna to continue her education and promised her to support in her every step.

MANUVIKASA has started receiving foreign volunteers through FSL India and started environment and English education in schools. These volunteers are involved in conducting summer camps, preparation of natural resources management plans and other regular activities of the organization. 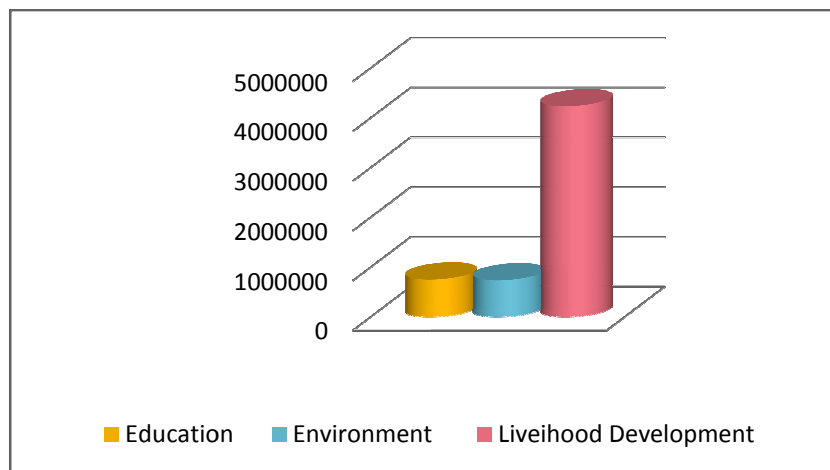
