Acquisition of knowledge is the first step on the path to global sustainability, prosperity and world peace. Innovation and progress too come via education, a universal right. In slum, 6-18 year age group have either never attended school or have dropped out, putting the literacy rate of the community much below the national average. Due to rising inflation and unemployment, more parents are unable to provide basic food to their children or meet their school expenses. There are others who have little money to get their children admitted to schools but can't afford to deal with daily expenses related to studies such as necessary stationery item, school bags, etc. It is for this reason Gram Sewa Sangh / AFS Nagpur had launched Child Academy Project (A Non Formal School) for the underprivileged children living in slum. Since then, it takes on the mammoth task of distributing school kits among needy every year. It may look like one-dimensional need. But school kit means much more to a child than just a regular part of school-going activity. The school kits, which allow students to further their studies, are particularly distributed among children living in unfavorable conditions or chronic poverty.

Each bag contains adequate materials for one student to study for one year. Through school kit distribution, Child Academy Nagpur not only seeks to enable children to pursue their education but also wants to raise awareness about the lack of access to education in the society. Child Academy Schoolbag Project may not be offering the ultimate answer to all the problems of the needy students, but it is definitely a step forward to empower young children by providing them with a key tool to become learned, innovative and progressive members of a prosperous society. Child Academy school kit – which contains best possible support as per need like uniform, shoes, fee along with a good looking bag, set of pencil, eraser, rubber, sharpener, glue and pen sachets, biscuits, note pad and reading books etc. Child Academy is thankful to JAFS who are keen to reduce school dropouts in India and strengthen our educational efforts. Every year, we have supported more than 100 students by providing school kits. These school kits had been distributed among very needy students of Nagpur Slum. We are also thankful to local volunteer who helped us in reaching deserving students and prioritizing educational assistance within School Kit Program. These school kits are simply a token of our faith in those children’s potential. This is just to make them feel that they are not alone. SCHOOL SUPPLIES PROGRAM

Being equipped with the proper tools for school is essential to academic success.

Gram Sewa Sangh/AFS Nagpur recognizes that in order to break the cycle of poverty and hunger, children must be prepared to learn and succeed in school. Additionally, statistics show that children tend to learn and retain more information if they perceive themselves to be on a level playing field with other children. Children that are academically prepared have higher self-confidence, self-worth and pride, which in turn, results in better grades.



An estimated that 8.1 million children are out of school, in India. Illness and lack of interest result in children being absent from school, which minimizes their educational gain. Once children begin formal schooling, they still face challenges such as low learning ability, lack of daily academic supplies, etc.

In 2021, while the world is fighting against COVID 19, due to extended lockdowns and time away from school, children from low-income communities are experiencing a loss of learning and shortage of any supply of academic materials.

The School Supplies Program serves school-aged children (Pre-K - 12th grade) whose families are unable to purchase needed school supplies. Each year, Gram Sewa Sangh/AFS Nagpur collects or purchases new back packs, pencils, notebooks, pens, paper, binders and other supplies for distribution.

EDUCATING CHILDREN FOR A BRIGHTER TOMORROW



Unfortunately, education remains a distant dream for 168 million children around the world. Often forced into child labor, they are robbed them of their childhood, health and education, thus trapping them in a perpetual cycle of poverty. Our aim is to make quality education a reality for every child. By providing education through child academy center by helping slum children providing much-needed food and healthcare, the future of tens of thousands of children are being forever altered.

Slum Children of Nagpur, India situation after COVID-19

Slum can be defined as 'A residential area where dwellings are unfit for human habitation by reasons of dilapidation, overcrowding, lack of ventilation or sanitation facility and having drinking water facilities in unhygienic conditions'.

Children growing up in slums experience a childhood that often defies the imagination of both the 'innocent childhood' proponents and the 'universal childhood' advocates. The slums typically lack proper sanitation, safe drinking water, or systematic garbage collection; there is usually a severe shortage of space inside the houses where the children live, and no



public spaces dedicated to their use. But that does not mean that these children have no childhood, only a different kind of childhood that sees them playing on rough, uneven ground, taking on multiple roles in everyday life, and sharing responsibilities with adults in domestic and public spaces in the community.

Children were to be seen everywhere as one entered the Slum. They played in the parks that wrapped the slum on the western side to hide it from the gaze of the city. They played on the rough ground and vacant lots dotted with graves, in the open spaces in the center where garbage was manually sorted. The parked rickshaws, vending carts, cars and bikes all served as play props in the streets. As soon as they could walk, children could be seen outdoors walking around mostly barefoot, climbing on debris and petting goats that freely roamed around. Girls as young as 5 carried infants and toddlers on their hip and moved around freely in the narrow pedestrian by lanes of the slum, visiting shops for sweets and the houses of friends down the street. Many houses open out directly onto the street through a doorway that often is nothing more than a 5-foot-high opening in a wall. Infants reach out of these holes in the wall and interact with passers-by.

The migrant population in India is mostly illiterate and constantly on the move, in search of new livelihood opportunities. Migrant children move with their parents and often lose out

on age-appropriate educational opportunities. Often they engage in labor to escape poverty and support their parents.

Access to early childhood care, balanced nutrition, education, health, and recreational facilities are keys to the positive development of children. However, in places where clean drinking water and two square meals are a struggle, slum children's education, health and other contributing factors for development will always take a backseat.

[Life after Covid19 Pandemic:](#)



The Covid-19 pandemic has made life difficult for India's poorest population that struggled for survival during the initial months of lockdown. Not just jobs and income, but inequalities have also increased in other areas such as healthcare and education during the pandemic. The coronavirus pandemic has made life difficult for the poorest population in the world as the economic crisis triggered by it has led to a sharp rise in income inequality.

The COVID19 pandemic and its economic and social consequences hurt some children more than others. In particular, COVID-19 exacerbates the risks of children experiencing maltreatment, violence at home, and poor nutrition, while lockdown measures reduced opportunities for children participate in extra-circular activities, to come in contact with supportive adults at school and in the community, and to access the justice system and child protection services.



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In India, over 30,000 children had lost both or either of their parents. Millions have lost their jobs. This COVID-led crisis in the family had left millions of children with very little or no financial support for their further education.

School closures due to COVID-19 heightened the child labor and child marriage risk in poor communities

When children cannot access quality education, and their parents or caregivers are unable to support their learning at home because they have low literacy skills themselves, families often have no choice but to send their children to work or and put them into child marriage. Survey respondents also noted that distance learning was almost impossible in poor communities which do not have telecommunications infrastructure. The obstacles that parents face are that they do not have a smartphone and adequate internet access. As such, their children cannot properly access school lessons.



Covid-19 had adversely affected food security

COVID-19 had worsened the food security situation due to decreased incomes, loss of job and other factors. Poor community is helpless as they have spent all their savings at the time of lockdown and in the treatment of their loved ones. They are struggling to fulfill the requirements of the family. Poverty usually is coexistent with food insecurity and is the main cause of hunger and malnutrition. Poverty exists



when there is lack of income, productive malnutrition, illiteracy, homelessness, inadequate housing, unsafe environment, social discrimination, and many more factors "Malnutrition not only denies people their right to health; it also has serious economic implications. Malnourished children are less able to concentrate in school, and malnourished adults are less able to work effectively.

Problems in Education of Slum Children

Focusing on Girl Child and Women Education



The cycle of illiteracy will continue if proper steps are not taken in time to reduce drop-out rates, increase enrollment and encourage girl child education and slum children's education. Mother is a child's first teacher. When mothers remain uneducated they cannot fully comprehend the value of education for their children. Children of educated mothers have better access to education, proper nutrition, and timely healthcare needs like timely immunization against various diseases.

Social, Health, Education, and Empowerment

Gram Sewa Sangh Nagpur's Child Academy works extensively with adolescent girls, youth and mothers. Remedial classes are conducted for them to teach them the concepts of learning more clearly. Academic material like school bags, tiffin, bottles, notebooks, geometry boxes are provided to them.



Healthcare services; medical camp, eye checkup, free medicines are provided to children and elders in their family. Adolescent girls are provided with sanitary napkins to break the stigma around periods and also to encourage attendance at school. We also conduct various health awareness programs for the children and their families.

It is a chance for us to come together and make a difference in a slum child's life that needs financial and moral support to complete their school education.



SALAIMENDA VILLAGE DRINKING WATER BOREWELL PROJECT REPORT

Project Proposal: SALAIMENDA VILLAGE is a very poor area consisting hard working Indian Tribal (lower caste) people. The people in this region are divided according to their Caste in every village. There are many restrictions for the low caste (Tribal) in every step of their life. Even now in this 21st century, these untouchable restrictions continue in every village including but not limited to where the villagers can fetch water. By drilling a borehole in the village, the people of the tribal class can find safe and plentiful drinking water at all times. This is an incredible blessing that will then allow the children, especially the girls and young women, to pursue their education and other life-skills training.

Salaimenda village was selected because of the pronounced number of restrictions due to the different castes in that village. The low caste people do manual labor, working for the land owners from morning till evening and are paid minimal wages. The families are very big and children are many, all working very hard to improve their life situation, especially education. These people have been struggling with drinking water problems for many years, having to travel considerable distances to get some water to drink and use for any other

purpose. Based upon the caste structure of this village and their needs. The Coronavirus has been very prevalent in this area, creating additional challenges. Now the problem is inflation which these people are also facing. As you know everything went up in such a way that the common man is unable to live with this kind of inflation. It is affecting every sector of work and life. We propose to your kind consideration to provide a borewell of



their own and humbly leave for your discretion this request to provide us needed help to complete the project. We are satisfied whatever you provide us. We take it as a great gift from the hands of God and appreciate the generous contribution of the Donor.
